Song Stories - It Is Well With My Soul, Raise A Hallelujah

Here at Meadowbrook, we sing a lot of different songs in worship. Be it a classic hymn, a well-known contemporary chorus, or something that is lesser known, we sing a variety of songs that help us connect with the Father and worship Him fully. But why so many songs, and why THESE songs in particular? Well, this series of articles is going to attempt to answer those very questions as we explore some of the songs that make up our worship sets on Sunday morning.

It's no mistake that two worship songs written generations apart, and so stylistically different from each other can still come from the same heart-place. We as people were made to respond to the Lord in worship, and our need for Him has not changed through the years, no matter how much culture has shifted, musical styles have differed, or language has morphed. We are still crying out to Him today just as we were 300 years ago. When we hurt, we reach for the Father. When we see people hurting around us, we reach for the Father. And when we remember how He has never failed to care for us, we resolve to keep praising Him even when life is falling apart around our ears. Most of us know the story behind the hymn "It Is Well With My Soul." Horatio Gates-Spafford was a very successful lawyer, blessed with a great family. A loving wife, Anna, four daughters, and a son. He was devoted to Christ and to serving faithfully in the church. But in 1871, his son passed away at the age of four from scarlet fever, and then two years later all four of his daughters died in a shipwreck on the way to Europe, leaving only his wife to send Horatio the heartbreaking news. This kind of pain is unimaginable to bear. Imagine being Horatio, crossing the scene of the sinking where he lost his four daughters. The longing he must have felt, to reach into that water and feel the touch of his children again. I do believe that not many of us parents would be able to resist the urge to climb over that railing and join them if we were in those circumstances. And yet, Horatio leaned into God as he carried that pain. He remembered that God was still faithful, God was still loving, and God had to part with His Child, too, in order to save us from sin. Horatio reflected on the good, even while surrounded by the grief, and in 1876, that hymn was published by Ira Sankey and Dwight Moody, having touched the heart of many since that day.

"It Is Well With My Soul" is not alone in that aspect. We sing another song hereat MCC that comes from a similar place. "Raise A Hallelujah" is a song written by Jonathan and Melissa Helser, and dedicated to Jaxon Taylor, the two year old son of Bethel Music CEA Joel Taylor, who was diagnosed with an aggressive virus that sent him into organ failure. Shortly afterward, Jaxon's sister Addie was diagnosed with the same illness. The Taylor's were informed by doctors that Jaxon would probably not survive. In the bleakness of this news, the Taylor's and Helser's cried out to God, and chose to worship Him in spite of the tragedy that was headed their way. They remembered the strength of God to answer prayers that many unbelievers say are unanswerable. God can work miracles when men write situations off as "already determined." And after several weeks in the hospital, He did just that, healing Addie and Jaxon completely, and sending them home with their folks.

Update from His House – Grand Valley State University

Here's an update from Scott Crary, Campus Minister at Grand Valley State University:

“Is this where the prayer happens?” a student asked, as she dropped into a chair at our Exam Week Prayer Table. It's a simple question with enormous significance. And it's a perfect way to describe ministry at GVSU this past year: small, but significant.

From the outside, our ministry looked small; about 8-10 students at our weekly meetings, Bible studies, and events. Yet inside, it was clear to see that our students felt loved, worshiped whole-heartedly, engaged with God's Word, and supported each other.

Back to the Prayer Table: it's not always clear what a student needs, because they don't always know. We pray for good exam grades and roommate relationships to be healed. And we also pray for family members who are sick and summer trips to France, which could lead to a career and marriage proposal.

In prayer and in our ministry, connection drives everything. People want — no need — to be connected with their Creator and His creation. And we tried our best to open up avenues for both through weekly gatherings where we worshiped through song, prayer, and a short teaching from God's Word. We regularly hosted board game nights and Mario Kart parties. Also, we found ways to serve together on campus by restocking the food pantry, praying with students, and handing out Exam Week Survival kits with candy and snacks.

Connection is key and we hope to continue and grow in that during this coming school year. Here are a few prayer requests for our ministry:

- Pray that Connection with Jesus is our highest priority and message
 - We need to meet more students and invite them to Check out His House - a small ministry is nice, but we have the capacity to lead and serve more students
- Pray that many would make the Decision to give their lives to Christ and follow Him whole-heartedly
- We need students to step up and lead key areas of our ministry: worship, events, service, Spring Break planning
