Devotion from Daniel

The comments below are from the year-end gathering for the Sisters In Service small group that operates out of Meadowbrook. I was invited to speak to this group of ladies who serve our community. Please note these comments were written and delivered prior to the tragedy we witnessed in Uvalde TX. But in light of that tragedy, I thought I would share them with you all here as well.

I first want to thank you all for inviting me and my family to be here tonight, and thank you for the opportunity to speak to you all. Every once in a while, it is nice to be able to speak outside of the "pulpit setting". It gives me a chance to speak to all of you a little more directly and lets you all get to know me a little more personally. Sometimes speaking in a smaller group setting like this also affords me the ability to speak on subjects or about subjects that in the moment don't naturally coincide with what our Sunday sermon series is speaking about.

So as I sat last week and prepared these remarks, what was on the forefront of my mind was violence. Specifically, the bloody weekend our nation just saw as a spurt of high-profile mass shootings occurred all over the country. It began on Friday in Milwaukee WI. After an NBA playoff game, 21 people were shot as two rival gangs exchanged gunfire in three incidents across the city. Then the next day an 18-year-old walks into a supermarket in Buffalo NY and opens fire killing 10, including the elderly, in an apparently racially motivated crime. Sunday, in what has become a disturbing trend of places of worship coming under attack, a presbyterian Church in Laguna Woods, CA was attacked by a gunman killing one and injuring five. In other shooting news, an arrest was made in a high-profile case in Dallas TX where a gunman shot three unarmed employees, in what is yet again being labeled a hate crime.

My mind spins as I watch this coverage. I watch the politicians and the pundits all spring into action ready to demonize and accuse. Ready to tell you exactly why this happened and how we can fix it if we would only vote for them or tune in at 11:00 to give their ratings a boost. Some will tell you this is a gun problem... we have too many of them and they are too easy to get. Some will also tell you this is a gun problem... we don't have enough of them, so the bad guys have free reign to be bad. Some will tell you it's racism, Caucasians

killing African Americans, African Americans killing Asians etc. Some will tell you it's mental illness and we need to have more and better access to doctors and medications.

Now if you're expecting me to go into long political rant about the evil democrats or the greedy republicans don't hold your breath. I find that when confronted with the nasty ugly realities of the fallen world we live in, it is much more effective to look to scripture for truth and solutions than it is to try to set fire to the "other". Because, at the end of the day, my goal is not to be proven right in my political opinions. It is to see God's name lifted high, it is to see an army of people marching alongside of me of all colors, making our way to the gates of heaven one day, when the father calls us home.

This is why I love small groups like siters in service who come together to serve the community. Look, it should come as no surprise to you that the world that we temporarily call home is full of evil. It should be no surprise to you because if you know God's word, you should know that this world became dark the moment. Adam and Eve ate from that tree breaking God's perfect creation. It took but one generation for violence and murder to rear its ugly head didn't it.

I always think back to how God's chosen people fall in the times of the Judges. We look back at the last three chapters of Judges and we see a people so broken in a world so dark. We witness one of the most horrific rapes/and murders ever recorded. We read about Israel kidnapping women, essentially trafficking them for their own benefit. We read about one of the tribes being slaughtered to the point of near extinction. It is dark.

Sadly, it reads very much like one of our newspapers today. I'm not trying to be bummer, I promise. I know that you all are gathering tonight to celebrate a year of good work. I just want you to remember two things as you reload and recharge for next year.

1. Do not be surprised that our world is so dark.
2. Never grow numb to the pain the darkness causes.

I tell you not to be surprised, because if you forget or neglect to acknowledge the evil, you are forgetting that you have an enemy. An enemy that Peter tells you in 1 Peter 5 is prowling like a lion. An enemy who comes to kill and destroy. We cannot become surprised that he is doing exactly what he has always done and what he will always do until he is cast into the pit in final battle between good and evil. If you truly believed hungry lions prowled the parking lot here at Meadowbrook, would it change the way you walked to your car tonight? Of course, it would. You would be foolish if you just skipped out to your car tonight smelling of delicious meatballs. If you believe that there is a lion that wants nothing more than to consume you and those you love you would be very intentional with your movements, your plans. You would plan every step, you would arm yourself, you would warn others of the imminent danger that was ready to pounce.

I tell you not to grow numb to the evil because that numbness quickly becomes apathy, apathy turns a heart lukewarm. You should hear the stories of human suffering and it should always break you. I'm confident in telling you this because what I see in scripture in the life of Jesus that he never grew numb to it. Think about it, John 1:1 tells us that Jesus is an eternal part of the trinity. Meaning that all the evil man has ever committed, Jesus was aware of and present for. Cain and Abel, Sodom, babies sacrificed to Baal, war, murder, all of it. You would think that after thousands of years of genocides, kidnappings, droughts, and famines, that when Christ became man and walked this Earth, you would think he would be numb. You would think that he would just be disgusted by the brokenness and evil. That he would just have wanted to

just show up and do his job and get out of there, defeat death asap and get back to the place where the streets are golden. But He came and He did the opposite.

How many times off the top of your head can you remember Jesus reaching out to someone in their moment of real tangible, physical distress and meeting the need put in front of Him. I couldn't list them all here if we spent all night together. How about the woman caught in adultery, about to be stoned for her crime, who stepped into the middle of the fray and convinced the hypocritical men to put down their rocks? How about the blind man sitting by the fountain, who took the time to rub that mud into his eyes and restore his sight? How about the paralyzed man whose friends lowered him down to Jesus in the middle of a teaching? In that moment, the restoration of that man took top priority. Jesus understood the real suffering that this broken world inflicts on its inhabitants, when John the Baptist was beheaded at the whim of a tyrant and a teenage girl... Jesus mourned and sought out a place where he could be alone. When someone he loved died, Lazarus... Jesus wept.

Jesus was not surprised by the darkness; he had seen it all... Jesus was not numb to suffering. This is why groups that are the hands and feet that see needs, that see places where they can push back against the darkness, where they can relieve some sufferings, even momentarily, are so important. They are important because they reflect the nature and character of our Lord and savior: whether you are providing a meal for someone who is hungry, giving a jacket to someone who is cold, providing a bed to someone who is without. When you do these things, you are showing someone that you too are not surprised or numb to their hurt.

Here is what I want to leave you with and encourage you with as you all plan for how you will serve your community next year. It's a question. Why did Jesus meet all of these people's needs? Yes, he had compassion on them, of course, but what was the overwhelming reason he acted?

1. To call sinners to repentance

a. Remember that women caught in adultery? When the crowd left, when they all went home to their glass houses. Do you remember what Jesus said to her? He says women where are your accusers? He says I don't condemn you either, go and sin no more!

2. To bring glory to the Father

a. Everything Jesus did, especially the blessings and the healings and the care that he bestowed upon people, it was always done under the big picture of the Father's will. It was always so that God's nature would be made clear, and that the creation would be drawn back into relationship with the Creator.

As you all prepare to get back out there keep your vision focused. You are not just a group of ladies who likes to do nice things for people. You are not just a group of women who feels bad for those who go without. You are sharing the Gospel with a world that needs it desperately. You are being the hands and feet calling the lost back to the Father. You are bringing the hope of a Savior to world that is in desperate need of one.

Sisters IN CHRIST Service


